

Students who intend to sit the University Entrance Exam in English should know what it entails.

Actually, the exam is composed of three (3) parts:

#### PART A : READING COMPREHENSION (30 POINTS)

In Part A1, students have to answer 3 open questions using information from the provided text (article).

Each correct answer gets 4 points. (3\*4= 12 points)

In Part A2, students are given 6 incomplete sentences which they are expected to complete by choosing one out of the 3 possible answers provided for each sentence.

Each correct answer gets 3 points (6\*3= 18 points).

#### PART B: LINGUISTIC COMPETENCE (30 POINTS)

In Part B1, students are given 5 sentences. Each one has got a blank which must be filled in with the correct form (derivative) of one of the words provided in a table above the task. There are **two extra words you will not need**. In this particular task, first you decide which word in the table is suitable for each gap and then you write the correct form of this word to fill in the gap.

Each correct form gets 2 points (5\*2 =10 points).

In Part B2, there are two columns of statements. The 5 statements in column A are full sentences, whereas the other 5 in column B are not complete. To complete them you have to think of one or two words (but NOT MORE THAN TWO), so that each statement in column B has a similar meaning to its equivalent one in column A.

Each correct answer gets 2 points. (5\*2 =10 points )

In Part B3, the task may have various forms. For example, students may be asked to match the halves of statements to form complete statements that are grammatically correct and make sense. A different version of the task may necessitate putting sentences that have been jumbled up in the order in which they should appear. **Each correct answer gets 2 points.** (5\*2 = 10 points)

In Part C, students are asked to produce a written text (e.g. article in which you express an opinion).

This part gets a maximum of 40 points.
